She is also delighted to report that Colleen, who had been with her for over a year and the traumatized black and white catten mentioned in the last news letter were adopted together to become farm cats in a very secure environment and are settling down very well.

Once again thanks to Peggy, Rinie, Anneliese, Elsa and Clarabelle who can turn snarling spitting horrors into friendly kittens, Lauren for taking on 3 kittens abandoned in a box at a service station and bottle feeding them, Maggie for the lovely cuddly blankets which will keep the kittens warm and also Trish for getting donations for us from Master Foods. All the other volunteers who help

with feeding and fostering, keep yourselves ready...... you will soon be hearing the patter of little kitten paws.

We are always looking for volunteers who will bottle feed the motherless kittens that are found so frequently. Remember, it will be only for a short period of time.

News from the adults

Since the last flurry of adult adoptions it has again become very quiet. As is always the case though the number of adults coming in has not decreased. There are now nine adults looking for homes. Although space permits at this stage, especially with the wendy house and its beautiful layout, a cage or pen is never a home. It has been scientifically proven, lengthy confinement in cages leads to stress and stress related ailments. It is therefore our endeavour to home these cats speedily to prevent this. We all importantly advocate not only "pro life" but pro-quality life.

Up for adoption is **Shiloh**, a beautiful longhaired female cat. She is lovable, cuddly and very talkative and will adapt very easily to most homes.

Kenny is a handsome tabby young male with lots of character. He has a courageous attitude and needs stimulation and lots of love. He gets on well with other cats. Although friendly he is very independent and would do well in spacious premises to explore.

Also looking for a loving home is **Archie**, a sweet natured ginger boy. Initially distrusting when being handled as he was beaten by humans. Very interested in making new friends especially with new potential owners.

On further investigation she found the mother-to-be stuck between two walls. The Fire-Brigade had to be summoned and had to drill a hole in the wall to free her. On her escape she ran away and Sandy was worried that she would vanish and have her kittens in a dangerous place. She phoned Avril later to say that she had returned to their home and has been provided with a "maternity ward" in a cupboard where she gave birth the next day to 5 kittens. Mother and babies are doing well.

A little while ago a little black and white cat was brought in from Rooiwal Power Station by Mr. Shiels. Jamie is the cutest little boy with a big personality and has a lot of love to give. He had abscess probably from a fight and was being treated for that. He has now been sterilized and placed in the cats'9lives sanctuary. We recall that sometime ago Mr. Shiels brought in a box with two kittens that had been left on his desk over a long weekend with no food or water. With a lot of care we managed to pull those kittens through and rehome them. Thank you Mr. Shiels for the compassion you have shown to these cats.
