KITTEN NEWS

We are nearing the end of the kitten season with over 200 kittens finding homes. The majority of the kittens were orphaned and one again thanks to the wonderful band of bottle feeders that have done and are doing a tremendous job. We cannot stress enough the value of the panel of bottle feeders who take on this very tiring but most fulfilling task so willingly - the results speak for themselves as anyone adopting one of our bottle babies gets a most well-adjusted and loving kitten. We have rescued a number of kittens dumped in boxes in the veld or on the pavement. The latest were newly born and left in the freezing cold to die a horrible death. Luckily they were found in time and are now in foster care.

Peggy and Rinie are the ringworm specialists, caring, isolating and medicating but gratefully we have only 1 case this season. On the whole the kittens have kept well and the reports-back from the new owners has been most gratifying. We find that most of the adoptions come as a result of referrals from vets, pet shops or happy owners.

Special appreciation to Alex and Andre who come every week to play with the kittens. Thanks to them the more timid kittens have come out of their shells and love this play session.

We spent a morning at a pet shop in Waterkloof Ridge showing off some of our bigger kittens and attracted much attention.

Our best news is that our remaining cattens now approaching 9 months have found wonderful homes and are so happy with their new owners. They have taken over the family beds and made themselves thoroughly at home.

Recently an advocate Elizabeth Nieuwoudt took on a case regarding cats in a sectional title complex and won. Some very clear rules and principles became evident and anyone contemplating moving into a complex should be aware of their rights before committing themselves. Why do cats eat plants?

Cats nibble plants indoors as a substitute for eating grass, which is perfectly natural behavior. Eating grass is like taking medication - it's nature's way of inducing vomiting. The reason why cats need to regurgiate (vomit) is to rid their digestive system of those painful hairballs that accumulates from grooming. Because they can't very well stick a paw down their throat to do the job, they instinctively seek out grasses or plants. Since they'll eat almost anything green, it's important that cats don't have access to toxic plants. You can make sure that your cat is safe from poisonous plants by buying special grasses for cats sold at pet supply stores. He will also love parsley, sage, thyme, and lavender.

FERAL CATS

Although we are not directly involved with feral cats, there seems to be a misconception about them and they just can not be ignored. They all originate at some stage from abandoned and unwanted domestic cats. Please read the article below and next time you see a feral cat show a bit of compassion.

THE FACTS ABOUT FERAL CATS ARE:

Feral cats are the offspring of lost or abandoned pet cats who are not spayed or nurtured.

Females can reproduce two to three times a year and their kittens, if they survive, will become feral without any contact with people. Cats can become pregnant as early as 4–5 months of age, and the number of cats rapidly increases without invention by caring people. A feral cat typically lives with a group of related cats as a colony and defends a specific territory where food (a restaurant dumpster) and shelter (beneath a roof or abandoned building) are available. Since feral cats typically fear strangers, it is likely that people may not realise that feral cats are living nearby, because the cats are rarely seen.

- People want to "get rid "of ferals, when in fact it is impossible to get rid of them as there is thousands of ferals living
 in our surrounding areas.
 - When ferals are removed, a void is created and other ferals move in.
 - A sterilised feral colony will not allow other ferals to move in.
- Feral cats keep the rat population under control, as rats are attracted to the same areas as ferals, normally at rubbish bins.
 - Feeding ferals will insure food health and minimise the spread of disease.
 - Feeding feral cats will not stop them from hunting, as this is a basic instinct.
 - Feeding ferals away from a building will keep them away from the building.
 - Ferals, who are not given food, will suffer from malnutrition and diseases.
